Week 1 – February 2nd Isaiah 1:1

Message Title: Isaiah: A Bird's Eye View

What reasons can you think of why it would be beneficial to read and study the book of Isaiah?

Read Isaiah 1:1

This verse gives us the 'where' and 'who' and 'when' of Isaiah's ministry. See what details you can piece together about the nature of each, based on the verses below:

- Where: Judah and Jerusalem—what were they like? (Isaiah 3:8)
- Who: Isaiah—what do we know about him? (Isaiah 6:1; 8:3—also look up what his name means)
- When: During the reign of four kings—which of these kings did Isaiah directly communicate with? (Isaiah 7:10-13; 37:21).

Look up the following references to Isaiah in the New Testament. What subject does each one cover?

- Mark 15:28
- Acts 13:47
- Romans 10:15
- Revelation 3:7
- What importance does Isaiah have in the New Testament as a whole?
- Why is the book of Isaiah important in the biblical story?
